



## Collaborative Working Project Executive Summary

Project title	A Collaborative Working Agreement between Sanofi and the Multiple Sclerosis Service within Barts Health NHS Trust to review and improve the patient journey and experience for patients with multiple sclerosis.

Project rationale	Barts Health NHS Trust operates from four major hospital sites (The Royal London, St Bartholomew's, Whipps Cross and Newham). The Neurology Department at Royal London Hospital provides a full range of District General Hospital (DGH) services and some regional specialties for a catchment area of around 2.5 million people living in the London Boroughs of Tower Hamlets, Waltham Forest and Newham.
	Approximately 150,000 patients live with Multiple Sclerosis (MS) in the UK and around 7,000 people are newly diagnosed each year. Bart's neurology waiting list consists of around 2,500 new patients waiting as of February 2025. The department is performing poorly on the Referral to Treatment Waiting Times with only 45.2% seen within 18 weeks of referral compared to NHS Operational Standard of 92%. The wait to be seen for treatment is up to one year which is therefore significantly impacting on new patients starting treatment.
	Despite current MS management for acute inflammation and relapses, patients continue to experience disease progression resulting in disability accumulation. DMTs (disease modifying treatments) are available for the treatment of MS and they are managed in secondary care in the North East London area. DMTs involve the regular utilisation of specialist hospital services. The financial burden is a particular concern with District General Hospitals who feel that they are losing out on income due a lack service level agreement between the Trusts and the ICB's. One of the key objectives of this project is to gather evidence of the financial implications that are attached to the outpatient visits, blood monitoring and unplanned admissions for patients with MS.
	Barts Health NHS Trust wants to conduct a review of the MS service as they recognise the need to understand where efficiencies in the process can help them free clinical capacity which in turn, will support them to reduce the waiting lists, improve efficiencies for patients & staff and build resilience in the service to allow them to grow. This collaborative working project is aimed at reviewing the current pathway and service, the outcome being to provide a list of options for service improvement. In addition, there are potential service changes that could be explored which would enable some of the MS services, currently delivered in hospital, to be delivered closer to patients' homes and potentially within patients' homes.
